# ...potholes won't get the best of us!

With current warmer weather and temperatures expected to Jim Justice and West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) kicked off Operation R.I.P. Potholes on Wednesday, January 31.

Asphalt plants open in Poca, Morgantown and Princeton, as of today, February 5, 2024, make it possible to patch with hot mix in those areas. These plants do not normally open until spring, but more potholes form during the freeze/thaw cycles of winter than any other time of the year.

"Our partners in the asphalt industry are cooperating with us to stay in the 50s and 60s over the next couple of weeks, Governor open during the off-season to provide us with hot asphalt to make needed repairs," said Joe Pack, P.E., Chief Engineer of Operations.

The Market Street Bridge in downtown Wheeling closed on Monday, January 22, 2024, for demolition of the bridge deck in preparation for a deck replacement project.

The bridge has been closed since being damaged by a fire in June 2022. On December 1, 2023, Charles I. Merlo Inc. was awarded a contract for \$1,351,000 to demolish and replace the old bridge deck. Construction is expected to be complete in the summer of 2024.

## Pauley, DOT Continue Policy Review

As the West Virginia Department of Transportation (WVDOT) as drug free workplace or drug and alcohol testing. continues a complete-agency wide policy review, Rita Pauley, WVDOT Assistant Commissioner, remains out front of the review.

Policies have been created in recent months, policies have been rescinded in recent months - 15 to be exact -- and policies have been updated. Pauley says there are 140 policies to review.

ownership of policy changes and to make sure that the employees they supervise are made aware of policy changes. In some cases supervisors may have a policy discussion during a staff meeting. They can make policies available by directing employees to them online, by email, or in hard copy for those who don't use a computer at work.

Some policies will require employees to sign a form acknowledging that they were in a meeting where the policy was discussed. Other policies will have an individual acknowledgment, like the WVDOT currently has for policies such

"We just want to be sure we are communicating with all DOT employees. We can't expect someone to follow a policy that we haven't provided to them," said Pauley.

Pauley reviews every single policy and talks to the employees who have to work closely with those policies. Many policies require multiple edits and discussions before they get to their WVDOT is now requiring all levels of management to take final form. Pauley said this is a purpose driven review as WVDOT works to become a more data driven organization.

#### pper Gassaway Bridge Demolished

On Tuesday, January 9, 2024, contractors Orders Construction brought the main span of the bridge down with explosives. Within 48 hours, the steel frame was lifted out of the river and the stone bridge support piers were demolished.

On Monday, January 15, 2024, Orders Construction began cutting the steel bridge frame into smaller pieces for disposal. Steel from the bridge is being taken to a local salvage yard.

Demolition of the Upper Gassaway Bridge in Gassaway is now The Upper Gassaway Bridge was built in 1935, replacing an complete, with the remnants of the 89-year-old span lying earlier span across the Elk River dating from 1912. A new deck was added to the bridge in 1963, with further repairs and renovations to the span in 1970, 1992, 1995, and 1996.

> But by 2016, it was apparent that the bridge needed replacement. The bridge, which carries WV 4 across the Elk River, sees about 1,900 cars a day. But the span was narrow, and carried weight restrictions limiting the amount of weight the bridge could support. A new bridge constructed immediately downstream now carries traffic.

### Parkways Authority Looks Ahead

Motorists who use the West Virginia Turnpike will see many be an Exxon service station, A.T.M., eating area, picnic area, changes in the coming year. The West Virginia Parkways clean restrooms, and free WiFi. Travel counselors will also be Authority plans to launch a new toll collection system, website, and user-friendly app to make it easier for customers to maintain their E-ZPass accounts. The Turnpike will also be able to process credit and debit card payments. The new system is expected to go live by Memorial Day 2024.

"This is a critical technological upgrade to our back-office customer service center as well as our roadside toll collection system," said West Virginia Parkways Authority Executive Director Jeff Miller. "It is a comprehensive upgrade on both fronts to introduce new technology and upgrade our patron experience."

The system will have new digital display signs above every toll lane. Any toll lane can be switched to an E-ZPass lane during shift changes or employee breaks. That means you will no longer see a red "X" above any manned lane. All lanes can now be used.

Miller said the debit and credit card system will feature tap-to-pay, but added early tests have shown the system can't process transactions as quickly as cash.

"No matter what is added or done to our tolling facilities, E-ZPass existence will be completed," Miller said. remains the most cost effective and efficient way to use the West Virginia Turnpike," he said.

making a difference in several communities served by the 40-year lease agreement with OmniTRAX on December 1, 2023. railroad. OmniTRAX, a rail and real estate company based in Denver, began running freight trains on the railroad on December 1, 2023, after reaching an agreement with the West Virginia Department of Transportation.

West Virginia Division of Multimodal Transportation Facilities employees will continue to maintain the tracks.

Shortly after taking over railroad operations, OmniTRAX made generous donations to three non-profit organizations in the railroad's territory. The company donated \$6,000 to the Romney Food Pantry in Hampshire County, \$6,000 to the Petersburg Interfaith Pantry in Grant County, and \$6,000 to Moorefield Active Caring in Hardy County.

"I think it shows that we picked a pretty good partner to work with," said Cindy Butler, Commissioner of the West Virginia Division of Multimodal Transportation Facilities. "They've already shown their commitment to helping the communities they serve."

The new operator of the South Branch Valley Railroad is already The West Virginia Department of Transportation entered into a

The lease agreement gives OmniTRAX the option to purchase the railroad after five years.

Butler said the state of West Virginia had operated the South Branch Valley Railroad since 1978 with state employees until OmniTRAX took over operations.

Butler said this is the 26th railroad that OmniTRAX operates, but the first one that incorporates a public-private partnership. Part of the lease agreement guaranteed assurances that state employees would be taken care of.

The agreement also acknowledges that the Potomac Eagle excursion train is also able to use the railroad tracks. The Potomac Eagle is operated by another private company.

The South Branch Valley Railroad is a 52.4-mile rail line between Petersburg and Green Spring, West Virginia. It used to be part of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

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#### **DMV Prepares for Busy 2024**

The year 2024 is shaping up to be busy for the West Virginia app on their mobile devices to confirm their identity at the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). It comes on the heels of a DMV, and at participating organizations and businesses. The successful 2023, which included the opening of the National Digital Title Clearinghouse, surpassing more than 100,000 online knowledge tests administered and the opening of the DMV's 26th regional office in Berkeley Springs.

"It's a heavily populated area in the Eastern Panhandle," said in the development phase. DMV Commissioner Everett Frazier. "We wanted to open that office up there to spread things out and help lessen the crowds in the other DMV offices in that region."

Online tests for drivers to get their learners' permits have really taken off, too. More than 52,000 online driver's license knowledge tests were administered in 2023. The online tests were first implemented in February 2021. Frazier explains what got the ball rolling.

"That stems from me getting a phone call from a local high school secretary that a young kid in school didn't have a way to take their learner's test and no one to take him. And, again, some of this was pandemic-driven but it stemmed from this phone call," Frazier said. "I went to my executive team and was like, 'You can take a college exam online. Why can't we take this learner's test online?"

The DMV has also reduced wait times at regional offices by 50 percent. The decrease can be attributed to many drivers' services being available online or at DMV kiosks, new DMV computer systems, and more efficient ways to process electronic liens and titles.

"For it to stay 16, 17, 18 minutes as an average statewide, that's huge," Frazier said. "Some places were over an hour, two hours. I mean to me that's mind boggling."

Technology is also playing a huge role in the DMV's latest endeavor. This year, the West Virginia Division of Motor Vehicles is working with IDEMIA, a secure identity solutions provider, to bring Mobile Identification to West Virginia. Residents will be able to download a West Virginia Mobile ID

DMV is hoping to roll out this new product in Spring 2024.

Frazier is also working on another endeavor which would literally bring the Division of Motor Vehicles to the people. He would like to create a mobile DMV program, which is currently

Like a bookmobile, "This is a unit that would travel throughout the state for people who maybe can't get to a DMV. This vehicle would perform DMV transactions," Frazier said.

He said the vehicle could also be used following a disaster. "Maybe help people get their credentials back. If they've lost their title in a disaster. If they lost their driver's license in a disaster, their registrations in a disaster. Anything to help them," he said.

Even with all the technological advances coming to the DMV, Frazier said people will still be able to conduct DMV business in whatever way is most comfortable for them.

Frazier said when Governor Jim Justice appointed him Commissioner in January 2020, he was given the task of modernizing the Division of Motor Vehicles. He believes he has done that and is looking ahead to a productive 2024.

"Just tweaking, getting rid of the unnecessary things, and honing in on what you can do better," Frazier said. "Focusing on customer service, how you can better serve the customers. The people in front of you."
