# WVDOH to Provide Additional Data fo Parsons to Davis Portion of Corridor

The West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) is providing additional data for an alternate northern route for a section of Corridor H to be built between Parsons and Davis, in order to expedite the design process.

WVDOH is preparing а supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to submit to the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) that includes a Blackwater Avoidance



Alternative route that runs north of the towns of Davis and includes a relocation of WV 32 to serve as a truck bypass route Thomas. 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stabilize А contract to а rockslide-prone section of mountain high above US 340 near Harpers Ferry is scheduled to begin Tuesday, Sept. 12, 2023.



In May 2023, Triton Construction Inc. was awarded a contract for \$10,277,500 to remove rock

and install rockfall barriers above US 340 where it hugs the River was built in the mid-1950s. The cut slopes and exposed Shenandoah River just south of Harpers Ferry. The project will rock tower from 150 to more than 300 feet above the roadway. require closing US 340 completely.

US 340 is a high-traffic volume corridor carrying about 24,500 vehicles a day including local, commuter, and truck traffic from The WVDOH is working closely with the Virginia Department of West Virginia, Virginia, and Maryland.

The contract calls for stabilizing the corridor through rock slope scaling, localized rock bolting, and removal of potential large scale rockfall hazards. Additionally, the slope will have rockfall Work is scheduled to be completed within 90 days. Access to the mitigation efforts including draped and pinned mesh, ground-level rockfall barriers, and on-slope rockfall attenuator period. systems.

A posted detour around the project area during work will be WV 9 and Virginia SR 9 and Virginia SR 671. Work is being scheduled after Memorial Day and before Christmas to lessen the impact on the traveling public.

West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) District 9 has Department. installed signs in downtown Lewisburg along US 60 Westbound indicating "No Right Turn For Trucks Longer Than 50 Feet."

This is a measure aimed at mitigating large interstate trucks failing to navigate the intersection from US 60 west onto US 219 north, while continuing to allow smaller delivery trucks and commercial vehicles to navigate through the city. On several occasions, large trucks have struck buildings while trying to negotiate the intersection.

because the turn restriction requires interstate trucks greater than 50 feet long to continue on US 60 westbound for approximately 11 miles before reentering Interstate 64 at Alta.

### Where There's a Will There's a Way: Funding Opportunities Available Through IIJA



The Infrastructure Funding Summit was intended to hook organizations interested in applying for IIJA funding up with federal and state officials able to provide advice on how to best apply for and receive funding.

On Wednesday, Aug. 23, 2023, Gov. Jim Justice gathered representatives from numerous federal and state agencies at the state Culture Center in Charleston for the Governor's Infrastructure Funding Summit. Purpose of the summit was to help identify opportunities to leverage local, state and federal dollars to take advantage of funding available through the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). West receive about \$7 billion in funding Virginia is expected to through 2027 through the act. Of approximately \$4.4 billion already announced for West Virginia, IIJA projects in the state include \$3 billion in highway projects, \$506 million in bridge replacements and repairs, \$487 million toward clean drinking water projects, \$190 million for public transportation, \$100 million for broadband expansion, \$46 million to build electric vehicle infrastructure, \$44 million for airports, \$14 million for cyber security, and \$11 million for protection against wildfires.

While the rules, regulations and hurdles necessary to receive project funding through IIJA are numerous, Wriston advised would-be applicants to be creative in their approach to project development.

If there's a project out there that someone really wants to fund, there's probably a bucket of money available somewhere within the IIJA framework to pay for it, Wriston advised.

The trick is to identify that bucket of money and go after it, Wriston said.

Complete the installation of the new traffic signals and overhead lighting.

Remove and replace the existing guardrail.

No work will be performed during the 2023 Bridge Day festivities in October. All lanes will be opened up during that time.

September 17-23, 2023, is National Child Passenger Safety (CPS) • Week. While we work to educate families year-round on the importance of child passenger safety when it comes to car seats, booster seats, and seat belts, we use National CPS Week to highlight common usage errors and car seat misconceptions. We partner with Highway Safety Offices throughout the country as well as the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to keep all children as safe as possible while traveling in • vehicles.

What are some important questions to ask yourself about the child safety seats you use?

- Are the children in the right types of seats for their height, weight, and maturity level?
- Do the car seats fit the children properly?
- Are the seats correctly installed in your vehicle?

We never want anyone to be involved in a vehicle crash, but in the event you are, we want to make sure you and the children in your lives are as safe as possible, by always being properly restrained in your vehicle. Unfortunately, crashes have become a part of everyday life, and the statistics show why it's so important to make sure children are properly restrained.

- On average, in 2021, two children under 13 were killed in passenger vehicles crashes each day.
- In 2021, more than one third (36%) of children under 13 who died while riding in passenger vehicles were car seat safety tips throughout National CPS Week. unrestrained.

Between 2017 and 2021, there were 1,753 "tweens" (8 to 14 years old) killed in passenger vehicle crashes.

Not all crashes are survivable no matter how well restrained vehicle occupants are, but proper seat belt and car seat usage provide the best chance for surviving a crash. Here's the good news:

- In passenger cars, proper use of car seats reduces the risk of fatal injury by 71% for infants and 54% for toddlers. For infants and toddlers in light trucks, the corresponding reductions are 58% and 59% respectively.
- NHTSA estimates that from 1975 to 2017, child restrains have saved the lives of 11,606 children under the age of 5.

State law requires children in WV to be in child restraints until at least 8 years old or four feet, nine inches tall. The best and safest practice is to keep your child in a child safety seat with a five-point harness until they outgrow the height or weight of the seat. Do not move children into booster seats until they outgrow the seat with the five-point harness. Some children are small and could use the help of a booster seat until age 12 or older, so that the seat belt fits them properly across the shoulder and hips.

### In the Face of Flooding

West Virginia Division of Highways crews are on the ground in times of flooding, opening up roadways to assist emergency responders and citizens in getting through. In Kanawha County, on August 26 and 27, our efforts were recognized by Kanawha County Emergency Management Director, CW Sigman, who credited Division of Highways quick response following the first round of flooding to prevention of worse flooding in a second storm.

"You can see behind us, this bridge was damaged in the event Saturday night," said Sigman. "Highways got in here quick and fixed it Sunday, opened it back up mid-Sunday afternoon so these people could get in and out. Thankfully it's still standing."

"Saturday, I was thankful for the response from Highways," continued Sigman. "Sunday I was very thankful and told them so. Today I'm even more thankful as we're getting these places opened back up. There was a lot of debris against some of these bridges. Highways cleared that. They cleared a lot of debris on Saturday, and if it hadn't been for that, there would have been even worse flooding."

Secretary of Transportation, Jimmy Wriston, P.E., has often called our West Virginia Division of Highways crews the best in the country when it comes to emergency response.

"Our people are absolutely phenomenal," said Wriston. "Crews were out Saturday night, on the ground, seeing what they could do, assisting the first responders to get access to places so they could check and make sure people were safe. At one point, in seven hours, they had a bridge that had been washed out reopened. They just went above and beyond."

Wriston elaborated to praise employees whose own homes were flooded, but who worked through the weekend and into the next week helping others.

"Many of them, their own homes flooded," said Wriston. "Their own property at risk, and they're at work. One employee lost his pickup truck, had his pickup truck wash away. He got that vehicle, hustled on in to work, filled out an hour of leave slip for that hour that he was out there getting his truck, and then went in and worked ten or twelve hours that day."

"The culture has changed in the Division of Highways," said Wriston. "They understand their place in the world, and their place as West Virginians. They have those West Virginia values."











Months of increased police patrols and the issuing of more speeding tickets are slowing drivers down in the Interstate 64 work zone in Barboursville.

In 2022, there were 800 crashes in West Virginia work zones, killing eight people and injuring 276. Gov. Justice directed West Virginia Transportation Secretary Jimmy Wriston, P.E., to do everything possible to lower highway fatalities in the Mountain State to zero.

In partnership with public safety officials and police organizations throughout the Mountain State, the West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) began cracking down on drivers speeding through work zones in March. West Virginia State Police, the Cabell County Sheriff's Department, and police departments from Huntington, Barboursville and Milton took part in multiple targeted speed enforcement operations in the I-64 work zone in Barboursville.

Law enforcement began cracking down on speeders in the Barboursville work zone in the middle of March 2023. Traffic data collected by the WVDOH show a dramatic decrease in the number of speeders in the months since the crackdowns began.

In March, only 20.43 percent of motorists traveling through the work zone obeyed the posted 55 mph speed limit, the data show. That number increased to 37.26 percent in April.

Decreases in speed were most dramatic for drivers going over 85 mph through the work zone. Drivers going over 85 mph dropped from 1.54 percent of all drivers in March to a low of 0.33 percent following increased speed enforcement.

## **WVDOH Repairs More than 100 Slips**

With the summer construction season well underway, the West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) continues to slips and slides repair throughout the Mountain State.

Gov. Jim Justice and Transportation Secretary Jimmy Wriston, P.E., have placed a special emphasis on taking care of the state's secondary roads and making the WVDOH а true maintenance organization, not just building and paving roads and bridges but taking care of them so they will last as long as possible for the people of West Virginia. Tracking. monitoring and repairing slides on roads is part of that process.

"Every slide we see is a little different," said WVDOH District 2 Engineer Rob Pennington, P.E. "We use a similar approach to evaluate each one and determine the best method to correct it."

On McComas Road and 4-H Camp Road in Cabell County contractors are using soil nails to stabilize two slides as part of the WVDOH continuing maintenance program. To properly fix a slip or slide, WVDOH







must evaluate each area for the most cost-effective solution which will function long term, providing the best value to taxpayers while keeping them safe on the roads. This evaluation takes time, but ensures that the project goes smoothly once on the ground construction begins.

Depending on how serious a slide is, Pennington said it could take anywhere from a couple of weeks to a few months to design a project to correct it. One option is building a piling wall – basically a concrete retaining wall secured by steel beams sunk deep into the ground – to stop the earth from moving underneath a road.

On McComas Road, designers chose to address the slide with soil nails, because utilities located alongside the road would have made it difficult to sink steel pilings.

"Soil nails are more like an anchoring system," Pennington said. "They go underneath the road."

Soil nails look like long steel bolts that are driven horizontally under a road to tie into rock and keep the earth from shifting. "It may be two or three rows of 50 soil nails," Pennington said. "It depends on the particular site how many they have to use."

Contractors are also installing soil nails at a slide on nearby 4-H Camp Road.

In all, the WVDOH has

completed more than 100 slide repair projects so far in 2023, with another 59 under construction or scheduled.



### Main Span of New Legg Bridge Lifted Into Place

The West Virginia Division of Highways (WVDOH) celebrated the continued success of Gov. Jim Justice's Roads to Prosperity highway and bridge construction and maintenance program on Wednesday, Sept. 6, 2023, as contractors lifted the main span of the new Donald M. Legg Memorial Bridge into position in Nitro.

The main span, five beams wide, 11 feet tall, and 314 feet long, was pre-assembled and lifted into place Wednesday from a barge in the middle of the Kanawha River. The section of bridge weighs about two million pounds.

"Thanks to the Governor, we are almost finished with this important project," said Joe Pack, P.E., WVDOH Chief Engineer of Operations.

The main span of the old Donald M. Legg Memorial Bridge was gently lowered onto a barge in December 2022 as contractors Brayman and Trumbull began disassembling the old structure. The bridge served the public for 60 years, opening to traffic in 1962.

Contractors have spent the past few months working on approach spans and pouring new concrete support piers for the main span on top of the old bridge piers. Lifting the main span into place completes construction of the bridge superstructure, although Brayman and Trumbull will still need to pour the bridge deck and pave the new







### roadway.

Contractors hope to pour the bridge deck before winter and complete paving when asphalt plants open in the spring of 2024.

Construction of the new bridge between the Nitro and St. Albans exits of Interstate 64 is part of an approximately \$225 million project to upgrade I-64 to six lanes from Nitro to the US 35 exit. The project also called for construction of five new bridges in addition to the new Donald M. Legg Memorial Bridge.

The project is paid for through Gov. Justice's \$2.8 billion Roads to Prosperity program.

"This is one of the largest Roads to Prosperity projects in the state," Pack said.

October 2022. Gov. Justice In announced the opening of the Nitro WW I Memorial Bridge just north of the old Donald M. Legg Memorial Bridge to carry westbound traffic. The old bridge is being rebuilt using a portion of the existing piers to carry traffic east. Each bridge will be four lanes wide, to allow drivers traveling between the Nitro and St. Albans exits to drive without having to merge into through traffic.

Completion of the two bridges and widening I-64 to six lanes will open a major bottleneck on one of the most heavily travelled sections of interstate in West Virginia. The old Donald M. Legg Memorial Bridge carried approximately 60,000 vehicles a day.

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
